SPEAKERS' BIOGRAPHIES

Ilan Berman is Senior Vice President of the American Foreign Policy Council in Washington, D.C. An expert on regional security in the Middle East, Central Asia, and the Russian Federation, he has consulted for the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency as well as the U.S. Departments of State and Defense, and has also provided assistance on foreign policy and national security issues to a range of governmental agencies and congressional offices. He has been called one of America's "leading experts on the Middle East and Iran" by CNN.

Margarita Assenova is a Senior Fellow at The Jamestown Foundation. She is a regular contributor to the Jamestown publication *Eurasia Daily Monitor* on political and energy security developments in the Balkans and Central Asia. Assenova is a recipient of the John Knight Professional Journalism Fellowship at Stanford University for her reporting on nationalism in the Balkans. She has authored book chapters and journal articles on security, energy, and democracy published by CSIS Press, Brassey's, Freedom House, Bertelsmann Foundation Publishers, the University of New Haven, and The Jamestown Foundation.

Stephen Blank is currently Senior Fellow at the Foreign Policy Research Institute (FPRI); immediately prior to his present position, he was Senior Fellow at the United State Institute of Peace (2020-2021) Senior and Senior Fellow on Russia at the American Foreign Policy Council (2014-2019). Earlier, Dr. Blank spent 24 years, 1989-2013, as a Professor of National Security Studies at the Strategic Studies Institute of the US Army War College in Carlisle Barracks, PA as well as a MacArthur fellow at the institution. His expertise covers the entire Russian and post-Soviet region and he has also written extensively on defense strategy, arms control, information warfare, energy issues, US foreign and defense policy, European, and Asian security.

Mariana Budjeryn is a Research Associate with the Project on Managing the Atom (MTA) at the Harvard Kennedy School's Belfer Center. Formerly, she held appointments as a Stanton Nuclear Security Fellow at MTA, a fellow at Harvard Davis Center for Russian and Eurasian Studies, and as a visiting professor at Tufts University and Peace Research Institute Frankfurt. Mariana's research focuses on the international non-proliferation regime, arms control, and post-Soviet nuclear history. Her analytical contributions appeared in *The Nonproliferation Review*, *Harvard International Review*, *World Affairs Journal*, *Arms Control Today*, *The Washington Post*, *Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists*, *War on the Rocks*. Mariana's book *Inheriting the Bomb: Soviet Collapse and Nuclear Disarmament of Ukraine* is forthcoming in 2022 with John Hopkins University Press.

Janusz Bugajski is a Senior Fellow at The Jamestown Foundation. He has authored 21 books on Europe, Russia, and trans-Atlantic relations, including *Eurasian Disunion: Russia's Vulnerable Flanks* (2016, co-authored with Margarita Assenova) and *Conflict Zones: North Caucasus and Western Balkans Compared* (2014), both published by Jamestown. He is additionally the host of the "New Bugajski Hour" TV show, broadcast in the Balkans, and is a columnist for media outlets in the US, UK, Albania, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Georgia, Kosova and Ukraine.

Wesley Clark, during his 34 years in the U.S. Army, rose to the rank of four-star general and was named director for strategic plans and policy of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. As Supreme Allied Commander and Commander in Chief of the U.S. European Command (1997-2000), he commanded Operation Allied Force, NATO's first major combat action, which saved 1.5 million Albanians from ethnic cleansing in Kosovo. In August 2000, Gen. Clark was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian honor. In 2004, the long serving, decorated warrior was a major contender during the Democratic presidential primaries and was considered to be on the short list of the party's vice presidential nominees. In 2014, Gen. Clark and Dr. Phillip Karber made several trips to Ukraine and authored the first authoritative assessments of what they both came to call "the Russo-Ukrainian War" that was unfolding.

Luke Coffey is presently Director of the Allison Center for Foreign Policy Studies at The Heritage Foundation. In his current position, he is responsible for directing policy research for the Middle East, Africa, Russia and the former Soviet Union, the Western Hemisphere, the Arctic region, and NATO. Immediately prior to his work at Heritage, Mr. Coffey was posted as a special adviser to Britain's Ministry of Defence. Earlier, he served as an officer in the United States Armed Forces, with deployments in South Europe and Afghanistan.

Ariel Cohen is a well-known international expert on Ukrainian, Russian, Eurasian, European and Middle Eastern foreign, security and economic affairs; global energy security; terrorism and organized crime. He is presently Director of the Program on Energy, Growth and Security at International Tax and Investment Center; concurrently, he is a Non Resident Senior Fellow at the Atlantic Council of the United States. For many years previous, Dr. Cohen served as Senior Research Fellow in Russian and Eurasian Studies and International Energy Security at the Heritage Foundation, working closely with Congressmen and Congressional staff members and cabinet-level foreign decision makers.

Eliot Cohen is the Robert E. Osgood Professor at the Johns Hopkins University's School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS) where he has taught since 1990. He served as Dean of SAIS from 2019 to 2021. Dr. Cohen received his BA and PhD degrees from Harvard University and after teaching at the institution and at the Naval War College founded the Strategic Studies program at SAIS. His books include *The Big Stick* (2017), *Conquered into Liberty* (2011), and *Supreme Command* (2002). In addition to public service in the Department of Defense he served as Counselor of the Department of State from 2007 to 2009. He writes frequently for major newspapers and is a contributing writer at *The Atlantic*.

William Courtney is an adjunct senior fellow at the RAND Corporation and executive director of the RAND Business Leaders Forum. In 2014 he retired from Computer Sciences Corporation as senior principal for federal policy strategy. From 1972 through 1999, he was a foreign service officer in the U.S. Department of State. Dr. Courtney co-chaired the U.S. delegation to the review conference that prepared for the 1999 Istanbul Summit of the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe and advised in the reorganization of U.S. foreign affairs agencies, mandated by the Foreign Affairs Reform Act of 1999. Earlier he served as special assistant to the President for Russia, Ukraine, and Eurasia and as Ambassador to Georgia, Kazakhstan, and the U.S.-Soviet commission that implemented the Threshold Test Ban Treaty.

Orest Deychakiwsky worked at the U.S. Commission on Security and Cooperation in Europe (Helsinki Commission) 1981 to May 2017. His country responsibilities throughout much of his tenure included Ukraine, Belarus, Bulgaria and other countries in the region. While at the Commission, Orest served as a member of official US delegations to numerous OSCE/CSCE meetings and as an election observer in Ukraine and eight other countries. He has authored or co-authored a sizeable number of speeches, statements, resolutions and articles pertaining to Ukraine or U.S.-Ukraine relations. Currently, Orest is Co-chair of the Transatlantic Task Force on Ukraine (TTFU) and a Senior Advisor at the U.S.-Ukraine Business Council.

Andrij Dobriansky, Director of Communications for the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America, is often referred to as the most visible face of the Ukrainian American community. With a history of appearances on *The Daily Show* with Jon Stewart, MSNBC, PBS, NPR, Voice of America and other outlets, he assists Ukraine and its worldwide diaspora in getting its message out. At the United Nations, he is the Chair of UN Affairs Committee for the Ukrainian World Congress, the international assembly of all public organizations in the Ukrainian diaspora of over 20 million people.

Katie Fox is deputy director of the Eurasia department at NDI. Prior to joining the Institute more than 15 years ago, Ms. Fox was legislative director for a large labor union as well as serving as an aide to two U.S. senators and a congressman. In her current role, Ms. Fox oversees NDI election monitoring, civic organizing and political party development programs in Ukraine, Russia, Belarus and Moldova. She has monitored elections in Bosnia, Georgia, Kyrgyzstan, Russia and Ukraine, and served on a NDI pre-election delegation to Ukraine in 2007.

Volodymyr Havrylov, Major General (ret.), currently serves as Deputy Minister of Defense of Ukraine. Immediately prior to his current appointment, he was Director of the Veterans Dozen Foundation. Earlier, he served as Defense Attaché at the Ukrainian Embassy to the United States (2015-2018). Gen. Havrylov started his military career in Air Defense units in 1981. In 1991 he joined the newly emerged Ukrainian Armed Forces and was selected to the first group of Ukrainian military attachés, and has since had tours in the United States, the United Kingdom and Romania. Before his US Defense Attache posting, he was the Commandant of the Military Diplomatic Academy in Kyiv. Gen. Havrylov has also participated in peacekeeping operations in Balkans in 1998 and the Anti-Terrorist Operation against Russian aggression in eastern Ukraine in 2015.

John Herbst is former United States Ambassador to Ukraine and presently Director for Eurasia at the Atlantic Council of the United States; immediately prior to the current posting, he served as Director of the National Defense University Center for Complex Operations. Amb. Herbst has worked as a political counselor at the US embassies in Tel Aviv, Israel, Moscow, Russia, and Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, as the Director of Regional Affairs in the Near East Bureau of the US State Department, as Director of the Office of Independent States and Commonwealth Affairs and as Principal Deputy to the Ambassador-at-large for the Newly Independent States. He was appointed Ambassador to Uzbekistan in 2000 before assuming the post of US envoy to Ukraine in 2003.

Hanna Hopko is presently Chair of the Board of National Interests Advocacy Network “ANTS”. Concurrently, she sits on Executive Committee of the National Council of Reforms and the Anti-Corruption Action Centre as well as on the Board of Trustees of and Bogomolets National Medical University. During the Revolution of Dignity, Ms. Hopko, a journalist by profession, was one of the leading members of the Civic Sector of EuroMaidan. During the parliamentary elections that followed the EuroMaidan revolution, she headed the list of the Samopomich Party and was elected into the Parliament of Ukraine. During her tenure in Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine, her reputation proceeded her; she served as Chairwoman of the Committee on Foreign Affairs from 2014 to 2019.

Glen Howard serves as the President of The Jamestown Foundation. Mr. Howard is fluent in Russian and proficient in Azerbaijani and Arabic, and is a regional expert on the Caucasus and Central Asia. He was formerly an Analyst at the Science Applications International Corporation (SAIC) Strategic Assessment Center. His articles have appeared in The Wall Street Journal, the Central Asia-Caucasus Analyst, and Jane's Defense Weekly. Mr. Howard has served as a consultant to private sector and governmental agencies, including the U.S. Department of Defense, the National Intelligence Council and oil companies operating in Central Asia and the Middle East.

Mykola Hryckowian is currently Director of the Washington DC office of the Center for US Ukrainian Relations (CUSUR); the Center has organized over 100 forums dealing with US-UA bilateral ties in the areas of national and energy security as well as economic and civil society development. From 2014 to 2015, Mr. Hryckowian was the Chairman of the Ad-Hoc Committee for Ukraine, a coalition of US NGO and Ukrainian-American communities that successfully advocated for the passage of the Ukraine Freedom Support Act 2014 and for the creation of the Senate Ukraine Caucus in 2015.

Natalie Ann Jaresko is an American-born Ukrainian investment banker who served as Ukraine's Minister of Finance from December 2014 until June 2016. To that post, she brought the experience she had gained president and chief executive officer of Western NIS Enterprise Fund (WNISEF) and a co-founder and managing director of Horizon Capital, which were disbursing United States Agency for International Development(USAID) funds to small and medium-sized businesses in Ukraine and Moldova. In March 2017, she was appointed as executive director of the Financial Oversight & Management Board for Puerto Rico.

Adrian Karatnycky is a senior fellow with the Atlantic Council's Program on Transatlantic Relations and managing partner of Myrmidon Group LLC, a NY-based consultancy that works with investors seeking entry into the complex emerging markets of Ukraine and Eastern Europe. He is a founder and co-director of the Ukrainian-Jewish Encounter. From 1993 to 2004, he was president and executive director of Freedom House, during which time he developed programs of assistance to democratic and human rights movements in Belarus, Serbia, Russia, and Ukraine.

David J. Kramer serves as the Bradford M. Freeman Managing Director for Global Policy at the George W. Bush Institute. Prior to joining the Institute, he taught at Florida International University's Steven J. Green School of International and Public Affairs, where he also Director for European and Eurasian Affairs. Before moving to Miami, Mr. Kramer worked in Washington, DC for 24 years, including as Senior Director for Human Rights and Democracy with The McCain Institute for International Leadership; President of Freedom House; and Senior Transatlantic Fellow at the German Marshall Fund of the United States. He also served in the U.S. Department of State during the George W. Bush administration, including as Assistant Secretary of State for Democracy, Human Rights, and Labor and as Dep. Assistant Secretary of State for European & Eurasian Affairs.

HE Oksana Serhiyivna Markarova serves as the current Ambassador of Ukraine to the United States since February 2021. Prior to her diplomatic appointment, Ambassador Markarova served as Minister of Finance in the governments of Volodymyr Groysman and Oleksiy Honcharuk. At the her initiative, in 2015 the largest open data portal in the public finance sector E-data was created, now it consists of modules spending.gov.ua, openbudget.gov.ua and proifi.gov.ua. Since the beginning of the Russo-Ukrainian War, Amb. Markorova has been the 'Voice of Ukraine' both in US mass media and the halls of Washington.

Alexander J. Motyl is professor of political science at Rutgers University-Newark. He served as associate director of the Harriman Institute at Columbia University from 1992 to 1998. A specialist on Ukraine, Russia, and the USSR, and on nationalism, revolutions, empires, and transition state theory, Dr. Motyl is the author of *Pidsumky imperii; Puti imperii; Imperial Ends: The Decay, Collapse, and Revival of Empires; Revolutions, Nations, Empires: Conceptual Limits and Theoretical Possibilities; Dilemmas of Independence: Ukraine after Totalitarianism; Sovietology, Rationality, Nationality: Coming to Grips with Nationalism in the USSR; Will the Non-Russians Rebel? State, Ethnicity, and Stability in the USSR.*

Tymofiy Mylovanov is Associate Professor of Economics at the University of Pittsburgh and the President of Kyiv School of Economics (KSE). Prof. Mylovanov is a co-founder of VoxUkraine, a group of global economists working on policy problems in Ukraine. From 2019-2020, he served as Minister of Economic Development, Trade, and Agriculture in Ukraine. In July 2016, the Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine elected him to the Council of the National Bank of Ukraine (NBU). In October 2016, Prof. Mylovanov was selected to be Deputy Chairman of the Council of the National Bank of Ukraine.

Steven Nix Esq. is Director of the Eurasian Division at the International Republican Institute. From 1995 to 1997, Mr. Nix served as Outside Legal Counsel for the Ukrainian Parliament's Committee on Legal and Judicial Reform. Upon his return to the U.S., he accepted a position as Senior Democracy Specialist at USAID, where he assisted in the design and implementation of democracy programs in Eastern Europe and the Newly Independent States.

Roman Popadiuk, a former U.S. Ambassador to Ukraine and past principal of Morgan-Lewis Consulting, presently serves as President of the Diplomacy Center Foundation and the World Affairs Councils of America's Chairman of the national Board of Directors. A retired member of the career Senior Foreign Service, Dr. Popadiuk brings more than 30 years of experience in the areas of national security, political risk analysis, communications strategy and energy policy, including serving on the National Security Councils of Presidents Ronald Reagan and George Bush. With his vast experience and contacts that span the globe, he brings a unique insight into international political and business matters.

Michael Sawkiw is a former President of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America (UCCA). He was first elected to the post in October 2000 in Chicago and subsequently re-elected in September 2004 in Philadelphia. Since 1996, he has served as Director of the Ukrainian National Information Service – and presently holds this position again. His key achievements in Washington have included the formation of the Congressional Ukrainian Caucus in 1997; passage by US Congress of a bill to authorize the construction of a monument to the victims of the Ukrainian Famine-Genocide of 1932-1933 and preparatory work with various election observers teams that the UCCA has sent to UA during the last two decades.

James Sherr OBE is currently Senior Fellow at the Estonian Foreign Policy Institute attached to International Centre for Defence and Security in Tallinn. Immediately prior to his present posting, he was Associate Fellow at the Royal Institute of International Affairs (Chatham House), where he head of the Russia and Eurasia programme between 2008 and 2011. Earlier, he served a member of the Social Studies Faculty of Oxford University from 1993 to 2012, a fellow of the Conflict Studies Research Centre of the UK Ministry of Defence from 1995 to 2008 and Director of Studies of the Royal United Services Institute (1983-85). Prof Sherr has additionally received recognition as a Visiting Fellow of the Razumkov Centre, a Senior Associate Fellow of the Institute of Statecraft and in June 2016, a GMF Bosch Fellow at the Transatlantic Academy, Washington.

William Taylor presently serves as Vice President for Strategic Stability and Security at the United States Institute of Peace. From 2011 to 2013, Ambassador Taylor was the Special Coordinator for Middle East Transitions in the State Department, appointed by the Secretary of State to ensure that U.S. support for the countries of the Arab revolutions was effective; his task was to coordinate assistance and support to Egypt, Tunisia, Libya and Syria. He served as the U.S. envoy to Ukraine, the sixth in a line of distinguished US diplomats, from 2006 to 2009.

Mark A. Thomas received his Ph.D. in Political Science from the University of Notre Dame and an MBA in International Business from the American Graduate School of International Management. His areas of expertise and research focus revolve around influence operations against western democracies, specifically Soviet/Russian influence operations leveraging the race/ethnicity issues in the US politics. He has also written extensively on Russian security policy. Prior to academia, Dr. Thomas worked in support of NATO and its out-of-area peacekeeping missions in Kosovo and Afghanistan; and served as Special Advisor to the Secretary of the Army.

Morgan Williams serves as President/CEO of the U.S.-Ukraine Business Council (USUBC); he was elected Chairman of the USUBC Executive Committee in 2005 and as President in 2007. Concurrently, Mr. Williams is Director of Government Affairs for the Washington Office of the SigmaBleyzer Emerging Markets Private Equity Investment Group; he became a consultant to SigmaBleyzer in 2001 and joined the company in 2004. Mr. Williams and USUBC have run hundreds of forum and seminars over the last decade and a half highlighting investment opportunities in Ukraine.

Walter Zaryckyj is Executive Director of the Center for US-Ukrainian Relations. The Center provides “informational platforms” or venues for senior-level representatives of the political, economic, security, diplomatic and cultural/academic establishments of the United States and Ukraine to exchange views on a wide range of issues of mutual interest, and to showcase what has been referred to as a “burgeoning relationship of notable geopolitical import” between the two nations. Dr. Zaryckyj completed his undergraduate and graduate work at Columbia University; he taught political science at New York University for nearly three decades before moving on in recent years to do postdoctoral research work on Eastern Europe.
